Scatological and Grotesque

- Scatological Humor is concerned with bodily excrement, but can be concerned with gas, blood, urine, feces, spit, etc.
- Grotesque things display a shocking excess of a physical trait or behavior. We laugh, remember Bergson, sometimes as a corrective.

Scatological and Grotesque

 Grotesque Biological conditions can be dwarfism, gigantism, obesity, deformity, etc.

 Grotesque Behaviors can be things like compulsiveness, hoarding, lecherousness, addiction, unbridled zealotry.

Example: Westboro Baptist Church



- Perform grotesque behavior as a way of shocking people's senses.
- Their beliefs have little to do with the overblown and confrontational manner in which they deliver them.

Example: Chris Farley



Used both grotesque physical conditions and mannerisms in comedy

Theories of the Grotesque and Scatological

- Mikhail Bakhtin these works celebrate
 the 'lower bodily stratum', functions of the
 body that we don't think about because
 they're considered dirty or sinful.
- Julia Kristeva certain works remind us of the abject, a condition that is created by biological processes that keep us alive such as excretion and defecation.

"The Lower Bodily Stratum"

 Health dictates that we remove bodily waste from ourselves and from close proximity to where we live.

 Historically, this task wasn't as unconsciously accepted as it is now. A change in consciousness was needed to make this apparent.

"The Lower Bodily Stratum"

 By having a socially necessary standard of cleanliness, we intellectually made certain biological functions and the body parts associated with them 'dirty', sometimes morally.

 While it is necessary to find these functions repulsive, it serves to separate our brains from certain parts of our body.

The Carnivalesque

A celebration of the lower bodily stratum,
 when the conscious demands of polite
 society are willfully cast aside for a time to
 celebrate the abject functions of the
 human body, which we have intellectually
 repressed for health reasons.

 Carnival is a time when all things may be considered equal.

Mardi Gras



The Carnivalesque is often considered festive, and is associated with a cultural or religious event such as Lent.

Example: I Like Opium (2008)

But The Carnivalesque can be figurative as well, flattening the symbolic or function

 In/Out, Oral/Anal opposition flattened, made similar.

Reminder of Death

- The abject thing is something we need to eliminate to survive biologically. Things like blood can also be abject, wounds, etc.
- The elimination of the abject can be a reminder that we are mortal and constantly produce waste, or that we are destructible and fragile.
- This might be the most obvious reading, but...

A reminder of Life

- Abject things also remind us that we're alive, and that life goes on beyond death. You can recognize the abject because you're not dead; being able to create the abject proves we're alive.
- "corpses show me what I permanently thrust aside in order to live. These body fluids, this defilement, this shit are what life withstands, hardly and with difficulty, on the part of death. There, I am at the border of my condition as a living being" (Kristeva, Powers of Horror 3).

Example: Terminator Eye Surgery

• The Terminator is a cyborg, half machine/half human.

 Wounds can also be considered abject.
 Because he performs surgery, we have an empathic reminder that he is both man and machine.

Regeneration & Revolution

- The carnivalesque celebration of the abject is both regenerative and revolutionary to Bakhtin.
- The repression of the lower bodily stratum is societal, and can be used to control poor and under-represented people.
- By celebrating the abject, we find the differences between classes is essentially small.

Synthesis With Freud and Bergson

 Truly scatological or abject humor, not simply potty humor, is routinely castigated as more offensive than most other forms.

 So, if it is revolutionary, this castigation could very well be for political reasons.
